

6. Please check your child's work for neatness and to see that each page is completed correctly. If it is important to you, it will become important to your child!








Rhyming Words

Sorting of All Sorts

- * to place objects in identifiable categories.
- * the concepts of color, size, and shape.

Activity


 Have your child collect at least 20 small objects of the same kind, such as different kinds of buttons, stamps, candies, coins, tools, etc.
Ask your child to sort the objects by color. Then ask your child to

explain why he/she put the objects in each category.
